Missing Student Procedure	<ul> <li>Most missing person reports in the college environment result from a student changing their routine without informing their roommates and/or friends of the change. Anyone who believes a student to be missing should report their concern to Student Development. Every report made will be followed up with an immediate investigation. Depending on the circumstances presented to Student Development, parents of a missing student will be notified. If parental notification is necessary, the Dean of Students will place the call. The Resident Director will abide by the following procedure when a student is reported as missing: <ol> <li>Call the student's room.</li> <li>Go to the student's residence room.</li> </ol> </li> <li>Talk to the student's RL, roommate, and floor mates to see if anyone can confirm the missing student's whereabouts and/or confirm the date, time, and location the student was last seen.</li> <li>Secure a current student ID or other photo of the student.</li> <li>Call and text the student's cell phone and call any other numbers on record.</li> <li>Send the student an email.</li> <li>Check all possible campus locations.</li> </ul>
